Musings from the ACE President

Alsea Community Effort (ACE) Board members met with Corvallis - Benton County library staff in February (including our own local library specialist Katherine Koetz) to discuss library programming and how ACE can support library efforts. As a result, the library will be contributing stories to the Alsea Valley Voice and will launch a social media campaign to make Alsea community members aware of digital books and free delivery services. Board members are also working with Friends and Foundation of the Library to fundraise for the **Alsea Community Library Legacy Fund**. The Legacy Fund is restricted to be used to pay for long-term maintenance of the Alsea Library Building. Since Eddy will likely not be here to participate, he has turned project management responsibilities over to volunteer Phil Plaza. Phil will keep the Board, library stakeholders, and the community appraised of progress on the project. Thank you, Eddy and Phil.

Water and Sewer Projects

The upgrades and maintenance to the Alsea water system have been completed. Focus is now turned to the upgrades at the sewer treatment plant. Final design commenced on the plans in late January and are expected to be completed by the middle of summer. Progress is being made on the funding agreement with EPA for the funds needed to complete the upgrades, so we are hopeful that we will maintain the late 2025, early 2026 bid advertisement schedule. However, as previously mentioned, the entire schedule is contingent on EPA finalizing the agreement, and the funds being released.


Alsea 4H Update



As spring begins, Alsea Charter School celebrates the achievements of our staff and students!

We honored students with 90% or better attendance during the first semester with t-shirts and certificates. We were able to honor over 100 of our students!! Thank you to our families' commitment to daily school attendance.

Our Kindergarten/1st grade class is building a garden near the playshed, raising worms to enrich the soil and planting seeds. We appreciate Davis Family Farms for supporting this project. After-school enrichment programs in pottery, culinary arts, choir, and dance have also begun this spring. Our MS/HS Leadership class is participating in the SMART program, reading with Kindergarten/1st grade students each week—a program that has proven successful and will continue next year.

Alsea Charter School hosted a "Literacy on the Farm" night on March 18th for our families to come engage in fun literacy activities. We also hosted a Scholastic Book Fair for our students to be able to purchase new books to take home and read! The School Board is using data from the Strategic Planning Survey to create priorities for the district. Community members are welcome to attend upcoming work sessions this spring.


The Alsea Class of 2025 Commencement will take place on Friday, June 6th, with details to be shared on our Facebook page in May. The last day of school is June 12th.



Current Informal Research: ACAC and Benton County need input from the community on a few issues. Please reach out to Sara at the contacts above if you have input on water quality in the village, speed of motorists on Hwy 34 through the village, Wi-Fi access in outlying areas near the cell tower above the village, or other concerns you may have.

Upcoming Population Survey: Early planning starts soon for the vital project of doing a population survey of the Alsea community to gather correct data for grant applications to improve the community. Rough plans are that the survey will happen this summer. Stay tuned for more on this important way that you can help your community.

Countywide Comprehensive Community Plan Rewrite: Alsea Community Action Collaborative continues to provide technical, logistical and facilitation support for Alsea Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) meetings. The March Alsea CAC meeting was a joint meeting with the BentonBelieves! communitywide comprehensive plan outreach group from Benton County Community Development. Shannon Bush, interim Planning Director for Benton County, and John Seaman, newly hired Code Compliance officer, were in attendance. The meeting was highly informative and interactive, gathering ideas for the main three focus areas for county planning for the next few decades, particularly in the rural areas of the county. Outreach will continue in other Benton County communities over the next few weeks. Agreement at the public meeting, attended by 18 people, was that workforce housing investment and changes to land use zoning are vital to Alsea to help staff the community-based services like the school and clinic. Board and Staff Development: The ACAC board now includes Naomi Shadwick, President, Mimi Stout, Treasurer and Historian, Sara Cash, Secretary, Jim Rea, Infrastructure, and Tim O'Neill, Emergency Preparedness.

Our most important staffing need at this time is for a Social Media Manager who is adept at online communications and could assume a growing role starting off as a personal contractor. If you are looking for some very part-time paid work to give back to the community, please reach out. Experience in graphics and materials development would be an added plus.



Note from the Editor - The email below is from Gary Stockhoff, Benton County Director of Public Works, to Janet Hendrix giving an update of water and sewer systems in Alsea. Much of this is verified on page 5 in the Benton County Update for Alsea.

Note from Sara Cash - Please bring your questions and concerns on this or any other community topic to the next meeting of the Alsea CAC on May 5th 6-8 pm at the Alsea Community Library Community Room. The Alsea CAC will try to have someone from Benton County Public Works at that meeting to answer questions. At the very least, the Alsea CAC can compile a list of items from the community to submit to Public Works. The public is encouraged to attend the ongoing Alsea CAC meetings, which are always the first Monday of the month at the Alsea Library from 6-8. If the first Monday is a federal holiday, the Alsea CAC meets the second Monday of the month.

Dear Ms. Hendrix -

The issue of capacity in the existing water and sewer systems in Alsea is complex. It is impossible to tell you there is a specific number of water or sewer connections available. The condition and limitations of the current systems are the primary contributing factor as to what capacity is available and what isn't available. Some of the more critical issues are listed below:

- In the past few years the sewer system has exceeded the maximum daily flow as set forth by the DEQ. It has only been on a handful of occasions, but DEQ is aware of them. The exceedances typically occur in the winter, and during heavy rain events. Storm runoff infiltrates the system, and causes daily flows to go up. The upcoming system improvements may help with this situation somewhat, but until the improvements are done we'll not know for sure.
- 2. Due to the unknown benefits of the new pumps and such we would be hard pressed to say the sewer system as presently constituted has much, if any, additional capacity.
- 3. Any proposed in-fill project would be required to perform a sewer needs analysis. The analysis would need to be completed by a licensed professional engineer. Based on the outcome of the analysis there MAY be an opportunity to connect to the existing sewer system. However, any additional sewer connections may also require the approval of DEQ. At the very least Benton County would review and approve any future connection applications.
- 4. There is some capacity in the water system. However, a similar water needs analysis would need to be completed for any proposed in-fill project. Once again there MAYbe an opportunity to connect to the existing water system.
- 5. The engineering analysis for sewer connections will be required prior to and after the current improvements being constructed.
- 6. Expansion outside of the existing boundaries of the water and sewer districts will be a heavy lift. Both on the land use side of the coin, and on the technical analysis of water/ sewer needs on the other side.
- 7. We are working with EPA and our engineering consultant to finalize the plans for the sewer improvements. We hope to be under construction with the improvements in late 2025 or early 2026, but the exact time frame depends on EPA releasing the funds.

ALSEA SCHOOLS CONSTRUCTION RESUMES THIS SUMMER

More exciting changes are happening at the Alsea Schools! Although construction of our new CTE building is now complete, we are continuing to make improvements to our facilities, not only improving the structural strength of our buildings, but improving their safety for our students, staff, and community. Two major projects will be completed this summer.

Thanks to a state-sponsored Seismic Grant, our construction team is moving forward with beefing up the structure of the gym, stage and locker rooms, as well as adjacent office spaces, this summer. This is the first of three potential projects. The School District has also applied for a second grant to improve the structure of the high school wing. If successful, design for that next step will begin later this year and we will request a third grant to improve safety in the elementary wing.

In addition, the school is replacing and expanding its current fire alarm system, again boosting safety for our students, staff and community.

Because of the size and complexity of the structural upgrades, the gym will be closed most of the summer to accommodate the construction crews. Work will begin in the locker rooms before school is out to ensure that everything is completed in time for next year's school activities. Work in the gym will begin immediately after the school year ends.

We want to thank you for your patience and support while we make these improvements to our schools. While they will not be as visible as our awesome new CTE building, they will strengthen our school and improve safety for years to come.


April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month!

An old friend of his recently set up a big show of his work in the Yachats Commons... which caught the eve of our ACE Board President Meredith Howell... who suggested this might be something exciting to bring to the library.

Who is Charles Swank? Charles is a very unusual human being. He learned early on what he wanted from life and stuck with it. Turns out it was two things: to paint and to live a deeply spiritual life. He has managed to combine the two in his art.

After completing an MFA at Yale in 1976, in the words of one of his mentors, Charles "committed artistic suicide" by moving from the East Coast art scene to a quiet West Coast community to raise a family. What followed was a lifetime of day jobs, but also the freedom to paint as he wanted. (Among his jobs, he has been a house painter, a butler for Mrs. Joan Kroc, the heiress to McDonalds, and a teacher's aide to developmentally disabled kids - a job he loved.)

His paintings are not your usual collection of forest scenes and seascapes. They are abstracted geometric visions, beautiful, accessible, and fun. You may experience them as spiritual, ethereal, and to some, psychedelic. Even if you don't think of yourself as a lover of fine art, they will surprise and please you.

The Importance of Bench Sitting: Musing on the Merc


